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President's Report Henry G. Sanchez

This past year has been a momentous one for the UNA-NY chapter. In 2004, we initiated a series of ambitious programs to raise the awareness of the local and international New York community about the important work of United Nations. Most importantly, as the host chapter of the UN we have an especially important role in informing our fellow citizens that we are proud to have the UN organization in our city. Because New York is the global capital of the world, the cultural capital of the world, and the financial capital of the world, it is fitting that we have the most important multilateral organization in our city. I am here to report that UNA-NY is

fulfilling its mission bringing our fellow New Yorkers and the UN closer.

The past year has been filled with a variety of programs, events, and presentations for members and friends. We have had mission visits to the Polish, Swiss, and Turkish consulates. For the first time in my memory our chapter hosted an art exhibition with local high school talent—in the UN lobby!

In early 2004, we began our relationship with a group called the Young Professionals for International Cooperation (YPIC). Thanks to the leadership of YPIC Chair and new

Our membership has been increasing over the past few years. Since 2004, membership has increased by 20 percent making us one of the fastest growing UNA chapters in the nation. This is due in large part to the variety of programs that we offer our membership.

Without the tireless work of our Executive Director Ann Nicol, it would have been difficult, if not impossible, to implement all of our activities. It has been our chapter's goal over the past five years to have an executive director position funded, and we have been very lucky to have the ideal person to fill that role.

JUTTA BERTRAM-NOTHNAGEL RECEIVES 2005 ELEANORE SCHNURR AWARD Ann Nicol

Jutta Bertram-Nothnagel, UNA-NY chapter board member and former president, received the Eleanore Schnurr Award on June 2.

Eleanore Schnurr worked for many years on a number of issues as an NGO

representative to the UN and was an outstanding and effective champion of humankind. In recognition of her exceptional service in support of the work of the UN, the Council of Organizations of the United Nations Association of the USA, created the Eleanore Schnurr Award to be presented annually to a non-governmental organization representative who exemplifies her courage and commitment.

Jutta Bertram-Nothnagel, like Eleanor Schnurr, has

distinguished herself at the United Nations. Currently she is Deputy Secretary General of the Union Internationale des Avocats, the oldest global association of international lawyers.

She is also the representative for the International Federation of Settlements and Neighbourhood Centres, and was the representative for the Association of the Bar of the City of New York and the United Nations Association/USA, as well as the Lawyer's Committee on Nuclear Policy.

Jutta received her first law degree, from Maximilian University in Germany and her LLM from New York University. She was a Senior Fellow at the Center for International Studies, also at NYU. She has been Advisor to the French Republic, Adjunct Associate Professor at *("Award," continued on page 6)*

She founded the UN Hospitality Information Service resulting in the creation of the New York City Commission for the UN and Consular Corps. She was Chair Emeritus of the Board of the Metropolitan College of New York and Vice President of the US Committee for UNIFEM, which she helped found in 1984. She is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, the Women's International Forum and the UN International Task Force on the Informal Sector Development in Africa.

Jacob Willemsen, Board Member

Jacob Willemsen is founder and owner of New Amsterdam Trade & Consultancy LLC. Since 2002 Jacob has offered various government and corporate clients services in the UN Procurement Market including coordinating UN Procurement Seminars on behalf of government organizations. Government Relations News

Our Government Relations Committee is prepared for greater activity in the fall. Uppermost on the agenda is advocating for the UN Consolidation Plan to repair the existing UN headquarters building, and construct a new building nearby that would ultimately consolidate all UN agencies and staff in the two buildings while adding more park and open space along FDR Drive. In 2002 the UN asked the UN Development Corporation (created by the New York legislature in 1968 to build other office buildings serving UN agencies and missions) for assistance in refurbishing the entire UN Headquarters complex. Unfortunately, the authorization needed from the New York State Senate is not forthcoming because of other concerns about the UN. This authorization is stalled even though the US Congress and the Bush administration have given their full approval.

The committee is looking forward to activating the UNA-NY membership, as well as our YPIC members, to develop a presence in the local offices of our federal and state legislators.

Young Professionals for International Cooperation

YPIC, a nonpartisan, national network of professionals between the ages of 21 and 40, works to promote effective US involvement in international affairs and in the UN. YPIC provides emerging leaders access to resources and contacts that allow them to act on issues of national and global importance. The group is made up of five committees that are region and issue specific: Economic Development, European Affairs, Human Rights, Humanitarian Affairs, and Latin American Affairs.

We've had a very active 2005 so far following our first set of events last fall. In addition to our committee events, we are highlighting the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) throughout 2005.

Ambassador Ahmad Kamal, President and CEO of the Ambassador's Club at the UN, was our first speaker of the new year on January 12. He opened our series of events on the MDGs, all held at the Zephyr Grill in the Beekman Tower Hotel, featuring ambassadors, scholars and UN officials and experts.

David O'Connor, Chief of Policy Integration and Analysis, Branch of Sustainable Development within the UN Department of Economic and Social Affairs, was our second speaker, on February 9. Salwa Kader, President of the United States Federation for Middle East

Peace, spoke on women's rights and the Middle East on March 22. On April 27, Ambassador Nancy Soderberg, Vice President-Multilateral Affairs at the International Crisis Group, spoke about Kosovo and moving towards a final status. On May 25, Meagan Bovell, Programme Specialist at the United Nations Fund for Women (UNIFEM) spoke about the third MDG— "Promote Gender Equality and Empower Women." We partnered with the United States Committee for UNIFEM on this event and panel discussing AIDS orphans from the policy and practical sides. In August, we continue our theme highlighting the MDGs with guest speaker Anika Rahman, President of the United States Committee for the Population Fund (UNFPA). She will speak about the fifth MDG, "Improve Maternal Health." ■

UNA-New York Screens Demme's Film, "The Agronomist"

UNA-NY held a screening of the documentary film "The Agronomist" at the Museum of Modern Art on April 7 in cooperation with Fairleigh Dickinson University and MoMA. Michele Montas, wife of the late Jean Dominique (the agronomist) and fellow radio journalist of "Radio Haiti Inter," was present, along with film director Jonathan Demme. They led an inspiring panel discussion following the film.

The theater at the MoMA was filled to capacity, with over 100 Fairleigh Dickinson students and MoMA and UNA-NY members. Demme introduced the film in a manner that captivated the audience. In his introduction, he revealed that he wanted Dominique to star in one of his "Hollywood" movies and it was not his plan to make a docudrama about Dominique's aspirations to fight against injustice, oppression, and poverty through his radio station "Radio Haiti Inter."

Demme and Jean Dominique met in New York, where Dominique was living in exile. Demme interviewed him extensively and then followed him to Haiti. But once Dominique reopened his radio station, he no longer had interest in Demme's "Hollywood" movie. "I am here to run a radio station, not to act in a movie," he told Demme. So Demme finished up the interviews and went back to the US.

Demme took the film footage off the shelf after he heard about the still-unresolved assassination of Dominique. Demme gave voice to the late journalist's convictions with this amazing tale of the fight and struggle that Dominique and Montas endured while keeping the people of Haiti well-informed and pursuing their own freedom of speech.

Michel Montas currently works at UN radio, but hopes to go back to Haiti one day and reopen "Radio Haiti Inter." During the panel discussion, she described both the political misgivings of Haitians and their hopes of a new beginning. However, the current political situation prevents her from returning soon.

This first UNA-NY film screening was a huge success and our collaboration with Fairleigh Dickinson and MoMA worked very well. We look forward to many more collaborative events. ■

Development Committee Notes

The Development Committee continues to stay the course and conclude the fund raising activities it initiated several months ago. The Board Development Fund has now passed \$12,000 on its way to the goal of \$15,000. We remain optimistic that by the June Board meeting we will have met our goals of \$15,000 and 100% Board participation. Communication Committee News

In an on-going effort to draw attention to the activities and programs of UNA-NY, we have mailed out media alerts and press releases prior to monthly programs. Our efforts have met with success, and we can report the following press coverage.

Journalist Damaso Reyes wrote for *Amsterdam News* in February highlighting UNA-NY's program on "African Women and HIV/AIDS" at the Polish Consulate. The guest speaker was Ambassador Judith Mbula Bahemuka, Permanent Representative of Kenya to the United Nations. Reyes wrote "while the specter of the HIV/AIDS epidemic has largely faded from Western consciousness, the disease continues to ravage Africa, especially large numbers of the adult population infected in sub-Saharan Africa." He names Ambassador Judith Mbula Bahemuka as one of the strongest advocates for change and quotes her throughout the article with facts and solutions presented by the Ambassador. The *Amsterdam News* article is available in its entirety on the UNA-NY website www.unanyc.org Journalist Pete Heinlein from Voice of America recorded the entire March program, "Impending Worldwide Water Crisis and its Impact on the Human Food Chain" with George Fischer, Professor of Geology, and Solomon Katz, Professor of Anthropology. Both professors gave a fascinating and at times disturbing account of our historical and current geological state and the world's quickly disappearing water supplies. Maureen Basquill Ruf is an attorney

She is also a member of the New York State Bar Association.

Executive Director's Report

It's been an eventful winter and spring for the New York Chapter of UNA and a very successful one.

Last year we enrolled 220 new members. Since the beginning of this year 90 people have joined us. I am proud to say that we are one of the fastest growing chapters in the United States.

This year, we have organized informative monthly programs with many prominent speakers. Among them have been Olara Otunnu, UN Under-Secretary General and Special Representative of the Secretary General for Children and Armed Conflict; George Fisher and Sol Katz, professors from Johns Hopkins University and the University of Pennsylvania; Ambassador Judith Mbula Bahemuka of Kenya; and

We added two members to our Board of Directors, including a member of our young professionals, and two Advisory Council members.

Our mission this year has been strengthened by our association with 200 young people, members of Young Professionals for International Cooperation (YPIC). YPIC holds monthly meetings at the Beekman Tower Hotel's Zephyr Grill where members network and deepen their understanding about UN topics and international affairs. This group is an active and thriving part of UNA-NY.

We have recently initiated a Student Alliance program which empowers middle school, high school and college students to be more informed

global citizens and support the work of the UN. Through this forum, students examine issues and cultivate a sense of global awareness within their educational communities. Our two summer interns are busy sending out packets and setting up appointments at New York City schools. We also assist students in setting up clubs in their schools. Each Student Alliance group is coordinating a United Nations Day activity and participates in outreach programs.

Our chapter has been busy in many new directions. We sponsored a high school art exhibition which was on view at the UN April 14–25. Students of the Manhattan High School of Art & Design exhibited their art work in conjunction with the United Nations meeting of the Commission on Sustainable Development. In April, we sponsored a film screening at the Museum of Modern Art. The film's director, Jonathan Demme, was our special guest and more than 100 people attended (more details inside).

Our 2005 Annual Meeting at the Polish Consulate on May 24 was well-attended and featured the UN's Olara Otunnu, winner of the 2005 Sydney Peace Prize.

This summer will see the beginnings of a UNA-NY outreach program for high school and college students in the metropolitan area—Student Alliance. The program's main goal is to identify and inform students who will ultimately defend, uphold, and determine the future of the United Nations.

The Student Alliance program allows students who show an interest in international affairs to be engaged in the mission of the United Nations by providing hands-on educational opportunities. Student Alliance connects motivated young adults through a nationwide network and encourages discussions and debate on a wide range of issues that concern the United Nations.

Participants also conduct activities that promote the UN to those within their community. Participants network with UN dignitaries through the programs of UNA-USA, including meetings at the UN. In addition, the Student Alliance encourages participation in community events such as a UN Day observance.

UNA-NY is already setting the groundwork with many schools in the city. Currently we are working with seven high schools and six colleges, among them the UN International School, The Dwight International School, Barnard College, and New York University.

When the school year starts up again in the fall, Student Alliance is expected to be ready to begin. High school advisors have already been contacted and are in conversation with UNA-NY.

A July event is planned for college students to provide an introduction to both the UNA and Student Alliance. New York is the home of the UN, and Student Alliance has the potential to engage the youth of the city and give them an important way to support the goals of the United Nations. ■
